

How Well Can You Steer?

Have you ever heard a male suggest that he might need practice in the male art of going fast? The fact that you have never crashed your car directly into something does not, in my opinion, qualify you for the Indy 500. The fact is, many women are born with faster reflexes that a man's, so there's no reason females can't out-drive males. I hear that some of you hit the ice in February. If you liked the ice event, you should love auto-cross, as it's the same thing, only warmer.

What if we all showed up at an auto-cross to refine our skills at the fine art of driving? Auto-cross requires concentration, co-ordination, driving skill, and an understanding of your automobile. A fast time around the track requires thinking and co-ordination of throttle, steering, and brakes. Do it in 59 seconds and you may be fast time in your class. Hard? Yes, a little, but "wow", will your driving improve with practice.

I've heard rumors of several fast Z cars in the club, but only two or three show up at an auto-cross. Why not give it a try, test your limits, and have some excitement????



In April the 1989 Rallye season gets under way, and it seems appropriate to let all of the uninitiated in on one of the best ways I know to have fun. There are other ways, I've heard, but we needn't dwell on them at present. This article is the first of one (or more) to let you in on what really goes on in a rallye.

Rallying is one of the oldest sports of sports car enthusiasts, having started back in the days when keeping cars out of the ditches and mud holes on the road was a challenge in itself. The sport varies somewhat from one part of the country to the other, but there are basically two types: Pro Rallyes, and TSD Rallyes. Pro Rallyes are (if you hadn't already guessed) for the pros, and they are as much racing as rallying. They have such things as sponsors, roll bars, the right tires, risks and prize money. They are driven by people who like to tear up the countryside, beat up their cars, take chances, and win fame and glory.

TSD Rallyes, on the other hand, are for those of us who like a challenge without the hazards, enjoy driving and competing in a civilized way, enjoy beer and pizza (or at least one of them), and get our kicks out of winning an occasional plaque to put up on the wall. TSD, by the way, stands for Time-Speed-Distance, which may give you a little clue to what rallying is all about. To get a better idea, read on.

The first ingredient of a rallye is a rallyemaster. This is a devious fellow (or group of such) whose sole purpose is to secretly lay out a course on public roads which the rallyist must follow exactly and at the prescribed speeds. The speeds change frequently, but are always within legal speed limits. The rallymaster does not take pleasure from keeping everybody on course and into the checkpoints at just the right time. No, his pleasure comes form making the course challenging enough so that almost everybody will make some mistakes and take wrong routes into the checkpoints, causing them to be early or late and therefore costing them points. The unfortunate rallyemaster who makes the course either too easy or (more often) too difficult, is vulnerable to the wrath of the competitors who may greet him with boos, hisses, protests, and possible lynching at the post-rallye scoring-and-socializing party.

A car entering the rallye must have, in addition to four wheels, etc., a driver (you never would have guessed), and a navigator. As a driver, I can honestly say that the more difficult job is that of the navigator. The driver (right again), has the job of keeping the car on the right side of the road, driving at the prescribed speeds as nearly as possible, and following the instructions of the navigator. The navigator reads off the route instructions, tells the driver where to turn and how fast to go, and acts as spotter and interpreter. The two must work together as a team to stay on course and be at the right place at the right time throughout the rallye. They must not let the rallyemaster outwit them (but let's face it, he usually does), and they must avoid recriminations, which can spoil the fun in a hurry. If it was all too easy, it wouldn't be any challenge or sport, now would it?

Sound good so far? Tune in to this column again next month for more detailed details. We'll also have a list of events.
